MOTORCYCLE MATTERS

BY BERT BENTLEY

Last month I said I would write a few words on four cylinder motorcycles this month - so here goes.

I must say as a start that my own collection of old machines will not be complete until it includes a Henderson.

Perhaps the first four cylinder bike was the Holden which was produced in England in 1897. This machine had pedals on the front wheel, just as a childs tricycle has today, and the four cylinder engine lay flat with the connecting rods driving directly onto cranks on the rear axle. Single speed of course and no clutch. It must have been a dandy to handle on the road.

Another old European machine was the Belgian F N (Fabrique Nationale). This was a small capacity four cylinder, along more or less normal lines. The motor was in the accepted position in the frame but its outstanding feature was the complete lack of drive chains — it had a shaft drive. This was a good machine.

In the early 1930's the British Ariel Company produced the first of their "Square Fours". This was a wonderful motor and was, in effect, two vertical twins with their fly wheel geared together. The first models were of 600cc but this was subsequently increased to 1,000cc. Unfortunately, they ceased production of these wonderful machines about five years ago. They are now real collectors items.

On the American continent, the "fours" followed a more orthodox pattern having "in line" engines of from 1000 to 1300cc and rear chain transmission. Such makes as the Cleveland, Henderson, Ace, Indian, Pierce (which had shaft drive) are mentioned, and all are now collectors' items.

The only "fours" made today are very high performance racing machines which cannot be purchased. The Italians have the 500cc MV Agusta and the Gilera, both



First we needed spark, there was none, with his trusty cigar pac Floyd fashioned a file, (all this was done in a fully equipped shop), and proceeded to clean the magnets on the brass flywheel,

then the points and voila, rich blue spark.

In their obvious enthusiasm, they didn't notice that the head was not bolted down, nor was there even a gasket: but you know Luke is a big boy and he decided to hold the head down with his bare hands and body weight and Floyd proceeded to kick start it. But wait --- we have ignition, we have compression, but what else are we missing. 
EDITOR'S NOTE



BIKE OF THE BI-MONTH

DAVE TISSOT'S 1947 INDIAN CHIEF

Dave bought this Bike incomplete and apart in Fall of 1984. The deal included an engine and tranny, the frame, wheels, front end, gas/oil tanks, buddy seat and several boxes of dirt.


One year later Dave has assembled a classic and functional ride. Although die-hard Indian restorers would be quick to point out several non-stock items adorning the old Chief, Dave figured on getting the machine roadworthy first, and worrying about details later (or maybe never). The original Ben Benson front end sports an early ('30s) Chief fender, an old British head lite and a set of Harley-Davidson Panhead handlebars from Tiny Robins' parts department. The foreward stopper is a Harley backing plate on an Indian drum (plenty of friction in there). No wide glide front end ever looked this pretty.

Moving on to the power plant, the big V-twin engine is the classic 74 cu. in. with a bore of $3\frac{1}{4}$ " + .040 and ample stroke of 4-7/16". The compression ratio is a modest 5.5:1, common to flatheads. Power output is 36 BHP at 4500 RPM, capable of propelling the Bike 90 M.P.H. For such a heavy machine, gas mileage is a very good 50 M.P.G.

Underneath the chrome, the spring frame is stock original. That beautiful chainguard is military chief. Siggi Klann provided the generator, exhaust system and lots of small parts and technical advice. The air cleaner is of the extremely rare non-filtering type. How does Dave describe the look and feel of his classic ride?


