Eulogy for Dave Johnson ...

Hello, my name is Norm Dumontier, a close friend of Dave for the past 20 years. I have been asked to share a few memories with you.

For the last three years, Dave fought a brave and courageous battle and kept an amazing front right up to the end. The multitude of visitors that came to see him over the past three months, were able to carry a conversation as if there was no problem.

Our society tends to equate wealth with money. By that standard, Dave Johnson might not be considered a wealthy man. However, if one is to use friends as a measuring stick, Dave was a very rich man. A testimony to that was the "Live Wake" organized by Heather, a childhood friend, and held for him at the "Zoo" in the Osborne Motor Inn last October. Hundreds flocked to the occasion. It is by no accident that so many considered him a true friend.

Through some of the information I have gathered, the puzzle as to how a person can have amassed so many friends becomes clearer. Dave lived in the West End for the greater part of his life. Mrs. Brunsel has retold the story many times of her experience moving in the neighborhood. Unpacking was not completed when a young boy clutching his sister hand came knocking at the door. Upon answering, Dave's first words were: "Got any kids?" This was a beginning of a friendship with Ray that has continued for the last 55 years.

Before his voice changed, he was a regular in the "Good Deed" choir. This group met on Saturday morning at Eaton's and could be heard live on the radio. He was a member of the Cubs. His good deeds have benefited his many friends throughout the years.

Some of you might remember Dave on his bicycle delivering prescriptions from a number of West End Drug Stores.

In high school, you might have played football with him at Daniel Mac. Or perhaps, you played hockey where this defenseman was a force to be feared by his opponents.

After school, Bill's Texaco was one of his favorite hangouts to work on cars and be with his friends. Another meeting spot was Teapot Motors located near the Salter Bridge. This is where he acquired much of his passion for British cars.

Out of high school, Dave like thousand of others can claim having worked at Eatons. Then, in the early 60's, he had three stints working in the nickel mines in Thompson. In between, there were attempts at completing high school. Next came the job as a clerk at the downtown post office. In hope of getting fast tracked as a letter carrier in Winnipeg, he accepted that position in Thompson. Changes of policy prevented reaching this goal.

Upon returning to Winnipeg, Dave began work in the restaurant business and became manager at Chicken Delight and Kavanaugh's. He worked at all three of the latter Winnipeg locations. In 1969, he accepted a job in Vancouver at Kavanaughs's, the only BC location. There, he lived in a commune arrangement.

His brother-in-law introduced him to truck driving. Much of the hauling was out west. Later back in Winnipeg, he accepted a job delivering Kaplun Camper trailers to Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. This was a great seasonal job, as April through September was the slow period when he could spend his time riding motorcycles and working on cars. He was never a member of any motorcycle group, but chose to ride along with various clubs and many friendships developed.

For a time he drove for Hill Securities, simultaneously caretaking for the Happy Vineyard restaurant. His part-time career as a bouncer began at the Town & Country Night Club. It also included jobs at the "Zoo", various hotels, sports events and rock concerts. He saw his first "Who" concert while providing such service. Some might attest to getting royal treatment by this friendly bouncer and being escorted through the door ahead of long waiting lines at such events.

In trying to help a friend get work in the electrical trade, Dave drove around and stuck signs at many construction sites. His tactics worked so well that he ended up as a helper at various wiring jobs. That was the launch of AAA Electric.

In 1979 Dave wrote his real estate exam and in 1980 joined the Real Estate Board. Brian Collie of Century 21 and many agents were the beginning of a new circle of friends. Buyers quickly learned of his honesty and later sought him out when they were ready for their next house. Dave would sometimes even sacrifice his own commission to help young people get into their first home.

In the early 80's, Dave gave countless hours volunteering with ABATE Manitoba and CMMG Manitoba, both aimed at motorcyclist rights. He helped with organization of the "Ride for Sight", the Toy Run and the Motorcycle Blood Donor Clinic in Manitoba. He was on the committee for the first Canadian Buffalo Hunt with the Antique Motorcycle Club of America.

In 1986, Dave registered Classic Real Estate and ran it as a one-man operation. It was shortly after that, in the fall of 1987 that I was introduced to him. Within a few weeks, we were off to the Fall Antique Auto Swap Meet in Hershey, Pennsylvania. This was a trip that brought him many happy memories. Needless to say, our friendship remained strong from that time forward.

One of his proudest moments was volunteering to help build a house for Habitat. By chance, he worked shoulder to shoulder with US ex-president Jimmy Carter. As usual, wanting to help others was so important in his life.

When one of my sons was getting married, a social evening was organized. Upon a simple request of a possibility of getting a few prizes, Dave delivered. He was always a master at finding donations from the many businesses that respected him so much.

Dave showed his romantic side on Valentine's Day 1994. Fran was greeted by a number of friends in Dave's Century 21 office. He had arranged to have a justice of the peace present for the ultimate "surprise", their wedding.

Dave will be very much missed by Fran, his brother Leo, his sister Emily, his other relatives and the hundreds of people that truly called him a friend. His quick wit and one-liners will never be forgotten.

- The President adjourned the chaos at 8:20 p.m.







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
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
