Rotary valve Norton

This to be confused with the Wankel-engined rotary Norton of much later but an alternative cylinder head on a Manx unit. The Manx engine and indeed the whole bike was in the ascendency then but even so the competition were experimenting with multi cylinders, higher revs and it would even then be obvious much work would be needed to keep the ohc unit competitive. Perhaps there was a feeling the rotary valve might just be a way forward to a smoother engine. How the concept came to the attention

hough often accused of sticking with the ohc concept, Norton did have the vision to experiment

with a rotary valve engine around

How the concept came to the attention of Norton race shop chief Joe Craig is explained by Roy Bacon in his book Norton Singles. Laurie Bond, famous for the Bond Minicar among other things, designed a rotary valve to sit on a JAP speedway engine. Joe Craig saw it, liked it and encouraged Bond to develop the idea at the Norton factory.

As can be seen from the line drawing the rotary valve sat cross way on the barrel, its carburettor on the end of the valve.


An interesting valve drive arrangement was needed to give the valve room to work. As the rotor was driven by the ohc shaft, which wasn't far enough out, a stepped shaft was devised, using spur

gears. The gears also pumped oil up to the massive bearings supporting the rotor. Though power matched the standard ohc unit of the time, there were other problems with it, probably not insurmountable ones but Norton policy changed and the project was shelved.

Pulling a chain

A drive chain on a motorcycle is mucky old thing to deal with if the split link has to be removed for any reason. Luckily *MotorCycle* readers in the 50s, as OBM readers do in the present day, offered their fellow motorcyclists the benefit of their experience. This tip appeared in 1956 and utilised an old pair of pliers, with the jaws ground to points, heated and bent at 90 degrees to pull the chain together while the split link was fitted.

TIRES - Pressures

When was the last time you checked your bike's tire pressures? It should be done on a weekly basis, but many of us forget to keep an eye on one of the most vital parts of our bike's set-up.

Underinflated tires tend to affect handling and braking as the lack of pressure means the tire wall isn't firm enough to properly cope with the forces exerted on it. Over inflation can also result in a deterioration in handling, as well as a reduced contact patch with the road. This can result in a lack of grip under braking.

Use a quality pressure gauge to accurately check your bike's tire pressures. Consult the owner's manual for the correct pressure. Remember, your tires may need more pressure if you regularly ride with a pillion passenger. Always check your pressures when they're cold.

It's also worth checking the condition and tread depth of the tires while you're at it.

TYRES

This is where the real safety issues come to a head, and the most important single issue is not size, profile etc, but age (and condition). Tyres do not last for ever - and members have reported some worrying and potentially lethal disintegration of tyres, and inner tubes, when the tyres have sailed through MoTs and specialist inspections, and look perfectly OK. I'll venture a personal view on this, which the tyre suppliers are not confirming, but I suspect it is true. In my experience "rubber" components simply do not last like they used to: modern bushes crack and deteriorate in a few years when they used to last for decades. I am told this is due to increasing use of synthetics in place of expensive natural rubber - and I personally believe the same has happened with tyres. Years ago a quality tyre (and Michelin was always top of that list) would last for decades - I won the 2002 Scottish Malts rally on Michelin ZX tyres that were around 30 years old. BUT you cannot do that now - even with Michelins.

Tyres made in recent decades have a life of no more than 10 years, and you are strongly advised to change them after 6-8 years. They go hard, lose grip, crack and can potentially disintegrate suddenly: insurers are aware of this, and may dispute a claim if aged tyres are found to be at the root of the claim. All recent tyres have date codes clearly embossed on the tyre sidewall – go and check your tyres now and change them if they are more than eight years old – and if you have inner tubes, fit new ones at the same time. The date code on modern tyres is a four-digit code in a 'window' on the side of the tyre: the first two digits are the week and the last two the year of manufacture. In the 1980s and 1990s, date codes had three digits, in the 1990s with a triangle or arrow in them. Even earlier, date codes were not mandatory and varied between manufacturers.


