

IDENTIFY THAT OLD BIKE

HOW OLD IS YOUR SCOTT

The following is a general guide to the dating of Scott motorcycles, with the addition of prefix and suffixes to the engine numbers denoting engine models after 1924. Is should be noted that new models were usually available after the Autumn Show and prior to the start of the calander year. Scott frames not recorded so engine numbers are the key.

- C The executive shall have control and management of the property and club-subject to the will of the membership.
- D Funds of the club shall be withdrawn by signature of the treasurer and or president.

8. Duties of the Officers

- A President: Chief executive shall supervise the club's affairs and activities, also set up the yearly meeting dates.
- B Past President: Shall take the place of the present president if absent from any monthly meetings, as well as be responsible for recruiting nominees for the upcoming executives. Also set up the executive meeting in January and August.
- C Secretary: Shall give notice of all regular meetings and keep permanent records of the minutes of such meetings and all other documents and records that relate to club activities.
- D Treasurer: Shall collect dues payable and make sure roster forms are filled out at the time, keep books of the club, disburse funds at the direction of the executive and report at the monthly meetings the financial condition of the club. The treasurer shall have the books audited at the end of the fiscal year, the month of December.
- E Publicity Manager: Shall look after promoting and advertising in the club's interest. Also responsible for poster and art work.
- F Activities Chairman: The activities chairman can appoint one assistant to help him/her to organize activities such as games, races, trials, etc..

- G Librarian: Shall be responsible for the purchase of new books, collecting repair manuals, parts books, advertising, magazines, etc., and catalogue each item. Shall be responsible for monthly raffle to raise funds for new books, and responsible for bringing books to the meetings.
- H Editor:- Shall be responsible for printing and mailing the A.M.C.M. newsletter each month. He / she is also responsible for the yearly roster, any other printed matter, and exchanging newsletters with other clubs.
- I Property Manager: Shall be responsible for all club's property such as club banner, advertisement, etc., and to bring them to any functions.
- 9. Other Appointed Positions
 - A Typist:- Shall type all information requested and required in the interest of the club.
- 10. Qualifications of Officers
 - A Shall be a member of the A.M.C.M. in good standing.
 - B Must be a member for over 12 months.
- 11. Voting for Officers
 - A Shall be a member of the A.M.C.M. in good standing.
 - B Must be a member for over six months.

A tripod is quite important for pictures of exhibits in museums and at rallies, convention halls, etc. (Always check to make sure that a tripod is permitted.) The colorful nature of the subject demands color film. of course. Kodak Ektachrome-X, Kodachrome-X and Kodacolor-X films are better to use than slower films whenever subject motion or poor light is involved. On the other hand, film of still higher speed presents a problem in taking close-ups with flash: you "run out of" small aperture! If you are taking existing light pictures by tungston light in a museum, use Kodak High Speed Ektachrome Film, Type B (ASA 125). If the museum is illuminated predominately by daylight, its possible that you may be able to take hand-held shots with an f/2.8 or faster lens, using Kodak High Speed Ektachrome Film, Daylight Type (ASA 160)

Do you want slides or prints? If you will need both, shoot Kodacolor-X film, it gives you color negatives from which prints or slides can be made. Incidently, its great exposure latitude is very helpful. In any case, if your camere does not have a built in meter, you will need a seperate exposure meter for this type of picture.

For those of you who want to do your own writeups for our club publication, I persOnally recommend that you use a black and white film like Kodak Verichrome Pan, rated at ASA 125, however shoot it at a rating of 400 ASa and this will give us a more grainier print. Also have the prints done in a mat finish, most photo shops will print them this way if requested.

Next issue I'll go into co-operation from the bike owner and picture situation. In the final installment I shall cover Flash Technique and Picture-making with the owners co-operation

HOW TO PHOTOGRAPH ANTIQUE MOTORCYCLES

In a recent conversation with our editor, I brought up the idea of doing a series on photographing your own antique motorcycle. Further to this, it would also come in handy for some of our members who are planning on going to the rallies in either Barrie, Ont., or Davenport, Iowa. This is a fairly deep and lenghty subject, so I will bring this project to you in three parts. The first one is in this issue and thus will be completed in time for our summer season and the afore mentioned outing.

PHOTOGRAPHIC OBJECTIVE

Applying photograph to another hobby can really be fun! Antique motorcycles offer a new challenge in colorful subject matter. Some pictures of motorcycle details are appearing in photographic salons. Who knows the handlebar may replace the steering wheel! Perhaps a related collection of pictures would be of interest to you, such as a collection of photos of different types of tank emblems. Another collection might contain pictures of as many different models and years of a certain make motorcycle as you can find - say. Indian. Perhaps you have a friend who is setting about to restore an antique motorcycle. He may not take the time to photograph his progress as he works. If you can make the necessary photographic history, both of you will value the results highly. There is also acceptance for good photographs of antique motorcycles in magazines both commercial and clubs. Slide shows on antique motorcycles can be quite popular, even with the general public.

CAMERAS, ACCESSORIES AND FILM

In the opinion of many photographers, a single-lens reflex camera in the most useful type of camera for photographing antique motorcycles, partly because of its ability to make extreme close-ups that have been accurately focused and framed. You also need close-up lenses for a really close approach. Flash (either bulb or electronic) is needed for fill-in light outdoors and for indoor shots.

BIKE OF THE MONTH

MY 1934 HARLEY-DAVIDSON 30.50 "C" SINGLE by Bert Bently

It was a beautiful sunny day in May 1931. My chum "Yorky" and I were on the short bit of pavement to the west of Calgary, I was riding my 1929 Harley 45 and Yorky was on his brand new Harley 30.50 "C" Single. The road was clear of traffic so we "got down to it", flat on the tanks and opened them up, I knew my 45 wouldn't do much over 65 but Yorky's new single was an unknown quantity. We rode side by side for the five miles of pavement and finished a dead heat. At that moment I made up my mind that one day I would get one of those singles.

Years passed by and on February 9th, 1966 I called in at Tiny Robin's shop for a visit. What did I see sitting on the floor of the shop. You guessed it, a motor from a 1934 Harley "C" single. Tiny and I had a discussion and it went home in the trunk of my car, after the exchange of \$15.00.

More years passed and in the meantime I found and restored some fourteen motorcycles. Finally I retired and we decided to move into a smaller house, so I disposed of my bikes (except my Scott) and at last decided that now was the time to get to work on my Harley single. Where to start? The big singles were fitted into 45 frames and so I had to locate some 45 stuff. A friend in Regina had a 1934 frame and forks, so I make a start. It was then I discovered that the singles only used the earlier 45 frames—the later frames had a curve at the bottom of the front down tube to accommodate the generator. I took my frame down to the A.A.A.A. meet in Davenport, Iowa, in September 1978 and was able to trade with a fellow for a 1930 frame, my forks were O.K..

There was a carb. on my engine. but the float and needle, and the float chamber cover were missing. At Davenport I located a fellow who had the parts I needed. More progress.

- 2) Proper mounting of turn signals on earlier motorcycles may be difficult and ungainly, and the vibration commen to earlier motorcycles will make reliable operation a serious maintenance problem.
- 3) Most of the restored motorcycles we are concerned with are used mostly during daylight hours. The Manitoba Riders Handbook suggests the use of hand signals in preferance to turnsignal lights during daylight hours. Therefore, even if our motorcycles were equipped with turn signals, we are advised not to rely on them for the majority of time we will be riding.
- 4) While a motorcycle bearing vintage plates is exempt from the regulation, many of our members owning postwar motorcycles prefer to avoid the severe operating limitations of the antique plate by purchasing the more expensive regular plate. This regulation places them in a very difficult position.
- 5) English motorcycles were not compelled to have lights until 1937, and as a result, have electrical systems of limited capacity, in some cases inadequate to power turn signals. You could also take example of a first world war era motorcycle which has no electrical system at all.

We believe that all motorcycles originally equipped with turn signals should certainly have them in good working order. We can also see the difficulty of enforcing a law based on this premise. Therefore we request that a cutoff date of 1969 be established and that all motorcycles produced in 1969 or prior to this date be exempt from this regulation. As the number of motorcycles on the road pre-dating 1969 is extremely small, only a small percentage of the registered motorcycles will be exempt from the regulation.

We urge you to give this matter serious consideration, and would welcome the opportunity to answer any questions you may have, or to provide any additional input you amy require. We may be contacted through out post office box as per our letterhead, or you can contact me personally at my home;

If you can locate any of the parts I still need it would certainly be appreciated.

TURNSIGNAL LEGISLATION:

As you know as a club we are against the turn signal legislation. A copy of our letter of protest is given below, we have sent a copy of this letter to the Premier, Minister of Highways and Transport, Leader of the Opposition, Opposition Critic for Highways and Transport, and Registrar of Motor Vehicles.

RE: Regulation requiring turn signals on all motorcycles

Dear Sir;

At its last meeting, The Antique Motorcycle Club of Manitoba voted unanimously to request an exemption from the above regulation (turn signals on all motorcycles) for motorcycles manufactured in 1969 and earlier.

We request this exemption on the basis of practical and technical considerations which we wish to draw to your attention. These are as follows;

1) Some motorcycles built prior to 1969 were equipped with electrical systems, such as flywheel generators, which are not capable of powering turn signals regardless of the owners intent to comply with the regulation.

In March 1979 I heard of a Harley 45 for sale in St. Boniface. It was a 1930 and was buried in snow, but I bought it anyway as I was told it had a transmission. I had a heart attack that spring, so it was May before I got the 45 home. It was a sorry sight and the transmission and clutch were very poor. Anyway I got footboards, crash bar, rear stand, and a few other parts.

Before going to Davenport for the 1979 meet I visited Tiny and found that he had the left half tank for a 45. Told him to hold it until my return from Davenport. (Incidentally, Siggi has been with me both of my trips to Davenport). I took the remains of the 45 with me to Davenport and was able to sell everything. In return I picked up the right hand side tank, saddle, footboard support rods, headlight bracket, rear wheel, chain guard, front fork bushings and studs, Siggi had with him a front wheel hub, he carried it down and I carried it back. I had the front wheel laced up when I got home. I picked up the half tank from Tiny, put some old tires on the wheels and put the lot together. Now sitting in my garage is an "Almost" 1934 Harley "C" Single. I had a great stroke of luck. A friend in Davenport is also restoring a "C" single and had two mufflers made exactly as original. For much loot I was able to get my hand on the spare one. I still need an exhaust pipe, but I can get that made here in Winnipeg. I now require both fenders, handlebars, clutch, a good transmission (I got a good case at Davenport), headlight lens, speedometer, toolbox, 'rear chain guard, but time will produce all these items one by one. Incidently Ross Metcalfe produced a good battery box frame and that is now complete.

The 1934 singles were finished in silver with red panels to the tank and fenders, quite attractive.

There have been only two Harley big singles at the Davenport meets I have attended and I know of another couple in the states. I think mine is the only one in Canada, but I could be wrong on that. There used to be one in the Harley dealers shop in Regina, but I haven't heard of it for some time.
