As I mentioned, the above is only an example, and the rate for other age and engine size should come from the Insurance Agent.


Agreed value insurance is something we have been after for a long time. It means that your old bike will not be written off for the book value of \$47.00 or so that the Blue Book shows for a 1937 BMU Model 16N Golden Turtle Twin.

Whether you buy it or not is up to you but at least the A.M.C.M. has obtained this coverage for you. It took considerable time and effort by A.M.C.M. members and Mr. Kilgour. Please give him some business if you can.

Also, remember that appraisals are for Insurance only and do not necessarily indicate the value of your bike. As they are done by A.M.C.M. members, remember they are not trying to insult you, nor should you ask for an overrated figure.

Let's keep it sensible and friendly, at least as long as we can!

ANTIQUE MOTORCYCLE INSURANCE

Effective immediately, M.P.I.C. is offering extension coverage for antique motorcycles. The rules are generally as follows:

Bikes must be 25 years old or older Bikes must be stock Bikes must be 75% complete Bikes must be appraised by A.M.C.M. Sidecars will be covered All rates are in addition to regular Autopac costs.

Actual rates are available from Autopac agents. However, I strongly recommend that Club Memers give this business to the agent who did most of the work to obtain this coverage, namely Mr. John Kilgour of Kilgour-Bell Agencies. Antique Bikers owe him many thanks for his time and effort.
