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DEAR MOTORCYCLERS:


GREETINGS from the A.M.C.M. Overseas Section! The Meeting is now called to order!

I was going to send you 5 empty sheets of paper as an overseas report on "Motorcycling in Denmark" but thought better of it.

The weather has been very mild -- one day of frost so far -- most days +5 to +8° C. I have roared about a bit on the Ducati - which is highly illegal I've found out (haven't paid registration tax - \$1875.) at that rate I may never ride it legally. I've also found it was illegal to leave my Matchless here when I went back to Canada this summer -- but that's the way it goes. On the bright side -- I now have a spot for the A.M.C.M. to hold the Spring Run. We've bought a 200 year old Farm with a thatched roof on about 1 acre of land. The house is about 1800 square feet and the out building about 5000 square feet -- talk about room to expand. Needless to say - dry storage is not a problem. The farm is built in a square with a cobblestone square in the middle, beamed ceilings and the whole lot. There is an apple tree and 4 large walnut trees plus a large yard and a raspberry patch. It is in a small town (across from a mightly old Church) about 12 miles north of Odense on the Island of FYN. The island is connected to the main land with a bridge. The "island" is about 50 miles by 80 miles. A chap from the next island (about 45 mins. by ferry) is coming over around Xmas - New Years for a visit. I met him this year when I was over on Holidays. He's an AJS-MATCHLESS Club Member. There seems to be quite a few old Bikes around -- but you don't seem to see too much of them hummmmmin!

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
