IF ENGINE FAILS TO START, IT MAY BE DUE TO ONE OR MORE OF THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS:

- 1. Gasoline tank empty.
- 2. Gasoline valve shut off.
- Discharged battery or loose or broken battery terminal connection. Check by turning light switch "on".
- 4. Fouled spark plug.
- 5. Spark plug cables in bad condition.
- 6. Badly oxidized ignition circuit breaker points.
- 7. Circuit breaker points badly out of adjustment.
- B. Wiring connections loose at coil or circuit breaker,
- 9. Clutch slipping and start not turning engine over.
- 10. Sticking valves or tappets too tight.

IF ENGINE STARTS BUT RUNS IRREGULARLY OR MISSES.

- 1. Spark plugs in bad condition or partially fouled.
- 2. Spark plug cables in bad condition and "leaking".
- 3. Circuit breaker points out of adjustment or in need or cleaning.
- 4. Condenser connections loose.
- 5. Battery nearly discharged.
- 6. Loose connection, possibly at one of battery terminals.
- 7. Intermittent short circuit due to damaged wiring insulation.
- B. Water or dirt in fuel system and carburetor.
- 9. Gasoline tank cap vent plugged and tank air bound.
- 10. Carburetor tampered with and badly out of adjustment.


SCREECH......SLIDE...... the
