The Wanted Labrador Adventures.

Everyone asks my wife Linda how do you do it? How can you ride on the back of the bike with your husband? The trick is a comfortable bike, proper warm clothing and a sense of adventure.

This trip would not have been possible if it wouldn't be for my love of motorcycles and my wife's sense of adventure. In life you need to take action and go for your dreams while the opportunities arise.

Linda and I had Just recently met, fell in love bought a house, a motorcycle and got a dog. If you ask me those are the necessities.

Traveling on a motorcycle is like nothing other. The smell, humidity, cold, warm, my wife's arms wrapping around me are all senses that you feel in the moment and when I'm in that element I seldom want to head home. I call it a passion but it is probably more of an obsession.

I am amazed how far my 1983 Yamaha Venture has taken us. We've worn out tires till the nylon threads have shown on Cabot Trail and have struggled to find places to do an oil change on the bike as we were told we don't service bikes that old on the Oregon trail. We've even stumbled upon the Bonneville Salt flats so it was a must to pull onto the dried up sea bed and give it a go.

I often take pride in telling people that this bike has taken us Coast to Coast and then some, as I ride it every day for my commute to work. My limit is two degrees or until the snow flies.

With each adventure comes a story and I have many stories to share as all we have traveled with are two wheels, a Coleman stove, a tent, as much warm clothing that we can fit in our

Saddle bags and when our Golden Retriever was small enough she'd ride with us two. Yes, our dog has ridden all the way to Niagara Falls and back from Winnipeg. She's no Tim Angel as our East Coast Friends would say.

The trip to Labrador originated with no time line, no destination and no employment. Our only plan was to head East. It was scary to leave with so many unknowns, but it was necessary to find our path. We both knew we had to go and my wife mentioned to me com'on let's pack the bike and head east tomorrow morning, it will be good for both of us to clear our minds.

It was near the end of August as we were getting ready to go back to school to teach, but instead here we are about to fire up the bike and head for a trip of a lifetime with little to no prep. First thing I did was pack our dry bag as full as possible with our winter gear as the weather had been cooling off and wasn't sure how far we'd make it? I headed over to my father in law's place .to borrow his coleman stove. Spent a few hours planning and packing everything we needed all while trying to pack as light as possible. As nervous as I was to leave I knew I'd feel comfortable once I'm on the bike in my element traveling with my wife. A few text messages sent to our family and friends to let them know that we were off and a quick pit stop at my mother and father in law's place for one last good bye and drop off our golden retriever as she has outgrown the bike and needs her own sidecar.

Turn on our microphones on our Helmets, take some extra strength to pull the bike off It's stand and fire It up as I signal Linda to hop on. Off we go.....

Linda had the Canadian Map in her pocket and mentioned that it would be really cool If we could make it as far as the East Coast, but stay in Canada and not go down to the States to gain time on any of the Interstates as we have so much to see in our own country.

I questioned our trip idea as I thought we'll be coming home in the snow? Weather was nice, the bike was running smooth as usual, turned on the cassette radio and looked ahead as we ride east on the #1 highway. Thought to myself if it get's too cold we'll just turn around. After all we won't melt.

Driving East into Ontario has always been a happy place for me as it is surrounded by beauty and reminds me of all of my Wakeboarding experiences in my late teens and early twenties. The Canadian shield offers windy roads, lake after lake, beautiful pine trees, rocky landscapes and a reduced speed limit. Riding in the country side is beautiful, but am constantly scanning the shoulder for any wildlife as deer can appear within a fraction of a second. You see many deer crossing signs along the way and smirk each time I see one of these signs because I've heard of people believing that deer only cross where the signs are labeled. But I guess if you don't know anything is believable. I myself am quite gullible. I was once told that a smartphone app could open automatic doors.

Our first day traveling wasn't too far as we found a really nice rest stop past Kenora to make our meal next to a small lake and dip our toes in the water to check how much it had cooled off. Out comes the Coleman stove and setup our tent to chill for the night. As usual we talk to everyone and made friends with the other travelers passing by. We chuckle as people are hesitant to approach us when there's nothing but a bike and a tent. The 70's EZ rider and Son's of Anarchy series give each biker the feeling like we could possibly be part of a biker gang. But on the contrary, two friendly teachers who are out for an adventure. Yet no-one has the guts to kick out any biker who sets up camp. That being said we knew we had to be quick in the morning to pack up and get out before any park authorities would drive by.

We are usually slow to get started in the mornings, but the added challenge to pack everything the way it was set us back a little on the first morning of our camp. Limited space on the bike made it a good challenge and making sure everything fit including our 5 litre Gerry can of emergency fuel. It took us a while to get going again, but was well worth it waking up right next to a lake that was as calm as butter. Every water skiers dream. The price was right too, FREE. We couldn't believe how vast and big Ontario was as Linda would plan and navigate from the rear passenger seat during highway speeds. Still not sure how she was able to keep that map together. She would strategically fold the map without tearing the folds that had been folded on both axis several times a day. Linda would make sure only the areas we were travelling were revealed on the top of the fold of the map, that way she could direct me on our helmet intercom.

Our Helmet intercoms were the best investment. I've had so many guy's tell me "I'd never ride with that as I ride to get away". I'd debate that it provides two sets of eyes on the road and has saved us countless of times when either of us would spot a bump, wildlife, oncoming

vehicles, people not paying attention...

In order to Ride as a couple it is essential to act as one with the bike with every corner, bend and obstacle. When you've ridden your bike everyday it becomes part of you, as an extension of you. When I ride with my wife It is most comfortable because it feels like professional dancers who have practiced every step and flow beautifully in sync with every twist and flow to the music or in this case wind and curves of the road.

I can't explain enough how riding a motorcycle is like art, zen and beauty. Riding is a slate of mind and relaxation. The hypnotizing lines of the road flying by, the big open sky, the freedom of riding for the sake of riding makes it addicting.


I know if you're reading this, you most likely love to ride and understand the feeling and freedom that your bike offers. I love it so much that I will usually select my reading material if there's a picture of a bike on the cover or some sort of element of a motorcycle or adventure. I remember running up to the living room window as a kid to catch a glimpse of a bike or atv riding by whenever I'd hear that unique engine sound.

Still to this day I have the same fever, but now I get to be that bike driving by as we venture across the country. The Great Lakes are a beautiful destination to ride to as I was surprised how quick we were able to make it there. At the time the highways were freshly paved and hugged the edges of the lakes. Gorgeous views everywhere we went. We could have stayed to explore longer, but were determined to continue riding. As we were riding through the rocky valleys into the evening a misty fog came upon us and it wasn't until a few minutes into it that I realized it was a freezing fog. It had cooled right off and weather is unpredictable especially along large areas of water. We kept riding until we spotted the next rest stop.

We often like to ride all day, find a nice secluded rest stop and book it in the morning as we are traveling with limited funds. The only time we got burned was when we took our golden retriever "June" to Niagara Falls and setup camp at a rest stop near our destination and because my wife's a teacher she liked to setup a tent in the classroom for something unique and exciting for the kids. It's great, although because it's use was mostly indoors it meant we didn't have the rain cover. Beautiful for a calm starry night, but at two in the morning it started pouring and the three of us had to take shelter in the entrance of the public washroom. I still laugh because we looked like classic hobos with a dog as people walk around us to go to the washrooms.


At the June 18/19 Meeting we were greeted by our guest Andon Walls from the Steinbach Regional Secondary School (SRSS)

Sadly we have lost a sister



July 12, 1949 ~ July 19, 2019 Dianne Best passed away peacefully to the sound of music on Friday, July 19, 2019 at the age of 70, at Ste. Anne Hospital, Manitoba. Dianne will be greatly missed by her family and friends. Dianne was a unique and special woman that lived life to the fullest; who wanted to experience it all. The family would like to thank the staff at Ste. Anne Hospital for the care and compassion they gave to Dianne. A Celebration of Life was held at Sobering Funeral Chapel, Beausejour, MB, July 26. Dianne was one of my story tellers and here is a true story about her aunt Frances. Some of you have read this story and for some it will be the first time. It still brings a tear to my eye.

You Just Never Know

When I was growing up I had an aunt Frances. I knew my uncle Wilfred met her in France during WWII and married her before returning to Canada but, like many who served, neither of them talked much about wartime. I knew such memories were disturbing and I never asked. My aunt Frances was very tall and slim and was as proper and 'stuffy' as any woman I had ever known. She was very strict, stern and seemingly had no sense of humour. I always thought she was too stiff and starched

for my taste but that changed the summer I was 17.

My father rode a Harley in the 1940s and I started riding at 15 on a Honda 50. I traded the 50 for a 305 Superhawk when I was 17 (1966) because I needed to be able to travel highway speeds. The Honda Superhawk was a FAST bike for its time, the fastest of the Japanese bikes then. I was quite proud of my Superhawk!



There was a family reunion that year at one of my uncle's farms just a few miles away so I decided to pop in, on the bike, for a visit. Motorcycles were still a bit of a rarity in 1966 so the Superhawk attracted a LOT of attention from my uncles and male cousins and many of them wanted to take it for a ride. All of them used the electric start. They each, slowly and tentatively, wobbled out the dirt lane a few hundred feet in first gear, trying not to stall, struggled to turn the bike around without dropping it, and wobbled back to the starting point, leaving it to me to put it back on the stand.

After all the men-folk had a turn and wandered away, my aunt Frances came up to me later in the afternoon with a shy smile and asked "May I take your bike for a ride?". She was dressed in a floral white sun dress with a flowing skirt and sandals, her hair in a neat bun and I was rather startled by the request, considering the way she was dressed so immaculately. She asked almost sheepishly but I was amused, smiled back and said "Sure!"

My aunt Frances threw one leg over the Superhawk, tucked her flowing skirt between the tank and her knees before flipping on the ignition and jumping on the kick starter.

She jerked the bike forward to take it off the centre stand and she took off with a ROAR, throwing dirt and gravel in every direction!

At the end of the lane she turned on to the paved highway in a sharp turn that almost put the bike on its side and then hammered the throttle. HOLY SXXT!

With each gear-change, I could hear the engine roar as she opened the throttle as far as it would go and she was in high gear within a few hundred feet. As she vanished over the first hill she had the bike flat out - I knew from the sound that she was near its 120 MPH maximum speed! As the sound of the bike faded over the hills in the distance I could see her crest each subsequent hill until she vanished in the distance.

My aunt Frances was gone for about 20 minutes before I could hear the bike coming back, still flat out and pushing 120 MPH - I could hear it before I could see it! A spot appeared and disappeared over the furthest hill, then the next one, then the next until she finally closed the throttle as she approached the laneway to the farm. She made a sliding turn, still at considerable speed, and came up the lane in a cloud of dust. At the last moment she threw the bike into a slide and came to a stop up on the main stand right in front of me without ever putting a foot on the ground - I had never seen ANYBODY do that before! She shut the engine off, stepped off of the bike casually, as if this was an everyday occurrence, smoothed her skirt, and very demurely said "Thank you." as she shuffled off to the reunion crowd. I was left standing there dumbfounded and wide-eyed! It was at that point that I noticed all

my uncles and male cousins looking very sheepish and hiding their faces as if they hadn't seen anything!

Later in the day my uncle Wilfred came up to me when I was alone and in a rather amused tone, said rather "You are probably wondering where your aunt Frances learned to ride like that. UNDERSTATEMENT!!! Damned right!

My uncle Wilfred continued, "When I met her during the war and during the liberation of France, your aunt Frances was a dispatch rider for the French Resistance during German occupation. You either out-rode the Germans (and their bullets) or you died."

My opinion of my stuffy and proper aunt Frances was changed forever. She had never spoke about the war or her role in it but knowing the truth I had the utmost respect not only for her skill with a motorcycle but for her bravery in defending her country. She laid her life on the line for something she believed in and she suddenly became my hero!



Blast from the past

Motorcycle Matters. The Cyclone

Some years ago I was in Minneapolis on business and took the opportunity to drop in on the Harley Davidson dealer there, Roy Egeberg of Egeberg Cycle Company. I was looking for a pair of 28 x 3 tires. In fact, Roy had several but they were not for sale as he is also a vintage and antique motorcycle enthusiast. However I was certainly glad that I called when I did it as Roy had just completed rebuilding, for a customer in Chicago, a Cyclone motorcycle, and my article this month will be devoted to that make.

As a matter of general interest, several motorcycles were manufactured in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area during the 1914-16 era and I can think of the following The THEIM made by Joerns Thiem motor Company of Saint Paul The Cyclone made by Joerns Thiem motor Company of Saint Paul

To revert to the cyclone. The one I saw was completely rebuilt as new-an absolutely first class job in a bright yellow colour and it made me drool. As a further matter of interest Roy had located the original producer of the machine. I think a Mr. Joerns, who was then well into his 80s and he had a picture of him standing by the machine.

Mr. Joerns thinks he produced and sold somewhere between 200 and 300 of the machines before closing his plant.

The machines were way ahead of their time. They had the front springs in a normal manner but this spring near rear end was most unusual, as the leaf spring employed was located on end below the saddle and in fact formed one side of at triangle with the rear fork stays. The motor was the most outstanding part of the machine. It was a V twin of, I think 1000cc capacity but employed overhead valves operated by overhead camshafts which in turn were operated by Bevel gear driven shafts. The magneto was also driven by bevel gear and a shaft. It has been reported that one of these machines reached at speed of 90 mph on a dirt track in 1916. Pretty good for a machine produced about sixty years ago. The last machines produced in 1916 were fitted with a three speed transmission

Roy also had in his collection a rare four-cylinder shaft Drive Pierce with the original paint, a 1915 Indian racer, a 1929 Super X, an old belt driven Harley Davidson, an 1925 Harley Davidson and several others.




