

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Bookworm Munchings and Musings

On my return I bring some Earl's Court history. Cruising through the club magazines I homed in on "The Motor Cycle", which was a weekly magazine from England. Imagine the activity level to support a weekly mag. In the November 1958 Show issue I found an article by Jim Sheldon. I don't recognize the name but he submitted a two page article dealing with the history of the yearly motorcycle shows, in particular The Earl's Court new models show. I've condensed it down to a few highlights that might be of interest.

The first show in Great Britain was put on by Sir David Salomons mayor of Tunbridge Wells: on his own grounds. This occured on October 15, 1895.

In 1897, the exhibit was called The Stanley Show, and was intended for pedal cycles, but included a few De Dion inspired motorcycles. The two wheelers then were called Moto cycles. The industry grew and in 1903 there were 300 exhibits in the Stanley Show.

1910 was the first Olympia Show after a lull in motorcycle interest, and was held there for another 25 years. The show was moved to Earl's Court in 1937, in London. World War Two interrupted the show, unfortunately. It was revived in 1948, and was opened by Field Marshall Viscount Montgomery.

I don't know when the Earl's Court shows ceased to be, but this is as far as the history goes to present day as this article appeared in a 1958 issue. The shows lasted for a week every November and seemed to be very well attended.

These issues of The Motor Cycle show very detailed photographs of the bikes, so could be used for checking equipment on a bike you are restoring.

Stay tuned for a bunch of our unsung scooter riders models in a future issue. There were an awful lot available in Europe over the years. More than just the usual Lambretta, that's for sure.

DID-JU-NO/??????? The Hondamatic was preceded by the BSA Fluid Flywheel by Daimler, introduced at the 1933 show. It was mounted on a single cylinder model.

scooters, and competition from 1900 to 1975.
