

September 16, 2003 Fire guts British motorcycle museum

A massive blaze at Britain's National Motorcycle Museum has destroyed 650 vintage bikes and caused damage estimated at £8 million, officials said.

Up to 100 people had to be evacuated from the Birmingham heritage site as more than 120 firefighters tackled the fire, which could be seen from 15 miles around.

Staff at the museum, which held about 900 of some of the world's fastest and most expensive bikes, were said to be "absolutely devastated" by the blaze, which gutted more than 70% of the building.

Several people were seen wheeling motorbikes out of the museum in an attempt to save them from the fire, a West Midlands Fire Service spokesman said. Only 250 bikes were saved and those destroyed were irreplaceable.

Fire investigators believe a member of staff may have thrown away a cigarette outside the building at Bickenhill, near Birmingham, which set fire to a nearby small pile of cardboard boxes, leading to yesterday's massive blaze.

Mr Glenis said: "These were outside the building, to the side, and it is also an area where staff can go to smoke. We think somebody put out a cigarette which was not completely extinguished, and which may have blown on to these boxes."

Mr Glenis added: "We are not treating the incident as arson at this stage and believe it was purely an accident."

Staff at the museum, which held about 900 of some of the world's fastest and most expensive bikes, were said to be "absolutely devastated" by the blaze, which gutted more than 70% of the building.

About 20 fire engines were called to the museum in Solihull, where they were forced to pump water from the nearby National Exhibition Centre to dampen down the flames.

Three of the museum's five display halls — which featured such two-wheeled classics as BSA Gold Stars, Sunbeam Twins, DMW Hornets and Triumph racers — were destroyed.

"I have not been allowed to get in yet, so I can't really asses the problem, but looking at it, it is just a sheet of ashes," said the museum's founder Roy Richards. "It is heartbreaking."

Despite the tragedy, Richards told BBC radio he was determined to rebuild his museum and adjacent conference center, which drew 250,000 visitors a year. "From ashes we shall rise again as fast as is humanly possible," he said.
