

LIKE TO TRAVEL? NOT SURE WHERE TO GO?

Well, you are not alone. But you can't go wrong when you pick a place with old motorcycles. My choice – Birmingham. You can't go wrong with this choice as, arguably, you will see the two best motorcycle museums in the world today.

A visit to Birmingham, England will enable you to see the newly rebuilt British National Motorcycle Museum. Remember – the place with the big fire. For information on this Birmingham, talk to Dave Pritchard. He makes the trek across the pond on a regular basis.



I am going to enlighten you on the other Birmingham museum – the one in Birmingham, Alabama.



The Barber Museum contains between 750 and 800 motorcycles on five levels with apparently another 750 put away in storage so that rotation of displays is ensured. It is the largest collection in America, representing 140 motorcycle manufacturers.

The Barber Motorsports Museum and Racetrack opened in 2003 as the Barber Motorsports Park. George Barber apparently made his gazillion in the dairy business, of which he sold a chunk for many, many pesos and built his dream facility. It has, in addition to the 144,000 sq ft museum, a full Grand Prix style racetrack, measuring 2.2 miles, with the whole Disneyland affair situated on 720 manicured acres of theme park.

Any time would be a good time to visit but if you can old motorcycle on a 2.2 mile! Well, that was the criteria to be entered in the Race of the Century. There were ten entries and seven motorcycles were ready at race time. The riders and machines were as follows:



Bruce Linsday, 1905 Harley single

Joe Gardella, 1907 Curtis single (bike owned by Bruce Linsday)

Dale Walksler, 1903 Indian single

Frank Westfall, 1907 Curtis single

Jim Dennie, 1906 Crouch

1907 FN 4 cylinder (rider unknown) (bike owned by Frank Westfall)


1907 Pugeot (rider unknown) (bike owned by the Barber Museum)



There was an exciting "start on the fly" as racers dressed in period costumes, aided by the odd pedal-assistance roared away from the start. The winner was the 1907 Curtis ridden by Joe Gardella which won by a large 30 second margin. Last year's winner was Dale Walksler with the '03 Indian. The first Race of the Century in 2005 was won by Bruce Linsday on his '05 Harley single. This is heralded as the oldest running HD in the world today.

If the museum, swap meet, races are not enough action for you, you can also attend a large vintage motorcycle auction with approximately 100 machines for sale.

This is a very special place if you like old motorcycles. Hell, even if you don't, it's too cool! Pack up the kids (or grandkids) in the old minivan and make it a destination! It's worth the trip...to Birmingham.

A discussion of motorcycle insurance rates followed. The general feeling was that a discussion with MPI might be useful to explore the unique insurance needs of those who ride older motorcycles.

A suggestion was made that the Swap Meet, which was tentatively scheduled for February, would be better if staged in April in order to take advantage of potentially more favourable weather. Agreed.

The President adjourned the meeting at 9:00 p.m.
